



Earl Stroud

April 6, 1920 - March 22, 2008

Memorial services for Earl Russell Stroud, 87, will be held Wednesday, March 26, 2008 at 2:00pm at the Colyer Funeral Home Chapel in Torrington, Wyoming with Pastor Roy Phillips officiating. An earlier memorial service will be held at 10am in Douglas, Wyoming at the Gorman Funeral Homes-Converse Chapel. Burial will be in the Hillcrest Cemetery in Lingle, Wyoming. Stroud, a resident of Douglas and former businessman of Torrington, Douglas, and Scottsbluff, died Saturday, March 22, 2008 at the Memorial Hospital of Converse County in Douglas. He was born April 6, 1920 in Lingle, Wyoming the son of Lester B. and Edith Maye (Martin) Stroud. He was reared and educated in Lingle, graduating from the Lingle High School in 1940. He worked at the family farm, a filling station, and lumber yard in Lingle as a young man. He was married to Emma Lou Koehler on June 13, 1942 in Torrington, Wyoming. They moved to Torrington, and he began his career in the grocery business first working for Safeway. In 1946 he bought a grocery store in south Torrington, which he named Stroud's Grocery Store. In 1957 he remodeled a building for the store, and in 1961 built a new store. In 1971 he sold the Torrington store and moved to Douglas where he owned and operated Stroud's Grocery Store, and selling the store to Decker's in 1977. He moved to Scottsbluff, Nebraska and bought the Town and Country Grocery Store, and retired in 1979. They moved back to Douglas, where he spent his retirement years. He enjoyed going to garage sales and auctions. His true love was his antique and collectible cars and going to coffee with his buddies.

He loved to spend time with his grandchildren, great grandchildren, and great-great grandchildren. He is survived by his wife, Emma Lou, of Douglas; daughter, Marcia (George) Nash of Torrington; sister, Arlene (Harry) Satchell and family of Bridgeport, Nebraska; sisters-in-law, Mary Stroud and family of Cheyenne, Wyoming and Betty Pirtle and daughter, Beverly of Santa Anna, California; brother-in-law, Roger (Janet) Koehler and family of Oak Ridge, Tennessee; grandchildren, Ronda (Ted) Stienmetz of Casper, Wyoming and Larry (Jamie) Schaneman of Torrington; great grandchildren, Meralyn, Darbi (Joe), Russell (Kendra), Lacy (Tony), Emma Lee (Stacy), and Kohl; great-great grandchildren, Mattie, Brynn, Talon, and Cooper; and step grandchildren, Lisa Tuttle and family and Megan Mitchell and family.
