They moved to Hawk Springs, Wyoming and she married Wayne Wesch on June 19, 1943 in Mitchell, Nebraska. They farmed and ranched in the Hawk Springs area for many years before moving to Torrington in 1979 but Wayne continued to ranch in Hawk Springs. Wayne died in 2004. Ila was very involved in community clubs and held many offices in them. She was a member of the American Legion Auxiliary, the Sunshine Club, the Wide Awake Extension Club, and served as a 4-H leader for many years. In her later years she enjoyed card clubs and bingo. Ila is survived by one daughter, Linda Wesch of Cheyenne; one granddaughter, Robin Bibbey and her husband Robert of Cheyenne; one grandson Rocky Heinrich of Hawk Springs; three great

grandsons, Sean Bibbey and his wife Kristie, Eric Bibbey, and Scott Bibbey all of Cheyenne; two sisters-in-law, Nelda Nab of Cheyenne, and Betty Wesch of Torrington; a brother-in-law, David Wesch and his wife Ann of Denver, Colorado; a nephew George Ishman of Springtown, Texas; and numerous other nieces and nephews. She was preceded in death by her parents; her husband; and one brother.
