She attended Northern Colorado College in Greeley, Colorado and then the University of Wyoming where she graduated with a Degree in Elementary Education. She taught in many rural schools before teaching in Hawk Springs, Wyoming where she taught until the school closed. Irene finished her teaching career at Corlett Elementary school in Cheyenne where she retired in 1980.

Irene was a lifetime member and the longest living member of the LaGrange Homemaker's Club. She liked to do needlework, cook, garden, and sew. She loved spending time with her family.

Irene is survived by a daughter Marsha Lund and her husband Jim of Woodinville, Washington; two granddaughters, Shay McBride and her husband

Michael of Seattle, Washington, and Shelli Mers of Dallas, Texas; a grandson Michael Mers and his wife Lori of Boise, Idaho; a great grandson Bryce Mers of Boise; two great granddaughters, Stacia Mers of Boise, and London McBride of Seattle; and many nieces and nephews. She was preceded

in death by her parents; her husband; three brothers, Ora, Ralph, and Burt; two sisters, Ethel Kessler and Hazel Green.
