Jim was born December 8, 1920 in La Vernia, Texas the son of James V. and Leila Ann (Slator) Wiseman Sr. Jim served in the Army Air Corp from 1940 to 1945 and was stationed in North Africa mainly as a B-17 pilot. Jim taught and coached in the Lingle, Wyoming and Torrington, Wyoming school districts for forty-three years. Jim is survived by his wife Beverly (Schliske) Wiseman of Torrington; daughters, Susan Quadracci and her husband Tom of Brookfield, Wisconsin and Sherrie Schrimpf and her husband Bob of Hartland, Wisconsin; sons, Coleman B.
