Juana was born May 12, 1912 in Leon, Guanajuato, Mexico the daughter of Selso and Ventura (Lopez) Rodriguez. She moved with her family to Texas in 1920 where they lived for a while. They then moved to Kansas and then to Wyoming where they lived in Guernsey, Lingle, and then Torrington. She married Manuel Martinez. She worked various jobs in the area including the railroad, farming, and as a dishwasher in a restaurant. After the death of her first husband she married Antonio Dominguez in Torrington in 1973.

Juana like to crochet, and she cut out and made paper flowers. She taught children Mexican folk dancing.

Juana is survived by her husband Antonio of Torrington, Wyoming; three daughters, Nicolasa Hernandez and Inez Flores and her husband Jose all of Torrington, and Lupe Gordon of Las Vegas, Nevada; one son Jesse Martinez and his wife Mary of Victorville, California; two brothers, Luis Rodriguez of Caldwell, Idaho, and Lupe Rodriguez of Pierre, South Dakota; three sisters, Paula Herrera and Grace Baros both of Hermiston, Oregon, and Lorenza Rodriguez of Kansas City, Missouri; 35 grandchildren; 110 great grandchildren; 90 great-great grandchildren; and two great-great-great grandchildren. In addition to her first husband she was preceded in death by her parents; one sister; two sons; one grandson; and two great-great grandchildren.
