Funeral services for LOUIE H. URBACH, 89, will be held at 2:00pm on Tuesday, April 3, 2007 at the Colyer Funeral Home Chapel with Reverend Ora Dailey officiating. Burial with Military Honors will follow in the Ft. Laramie Cemetery. Louie died on March 30, 2007 at the Regional West Medical Center in Scottsbluff, Nebraska. Louie was born on September 14, 1917 in Bayard, Nebraska the son of Louis and Amelia (Bott) Urbach. He grew up and attended school at Bayard. The family then moved to a farm south of Torrington, Wyoming. Louie entered the United States Air Force and served during WWII. Following his discharge he moved to Scottsbluff, Nebraska. He married Bernice 'Lucy' Oliver on October 15, 1946 at Bridgeport, Nebraska. The couple lived at Scottsbluff, Nebraska for six years where Louie worked as a carpenter. They then moved to Denver, Colorado where they lived for 36 years. Louie retired from the Carpenters Union in Denver in 1979 and the couple moved to Ft. Laramie, Wyoming in 1988. In 1998 they moved to Torrington. Louie was a member of the Elks, the Masonic Lodge, and a member of the Congregational Church. He enjoyed playing cards and golf; and liked to travel. He is survived by his wife, Bernice 'Lucy' Urbach of Torrington and many nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents, and five brothers, Henry, Conrad, John, Arthur, and Herman.
